

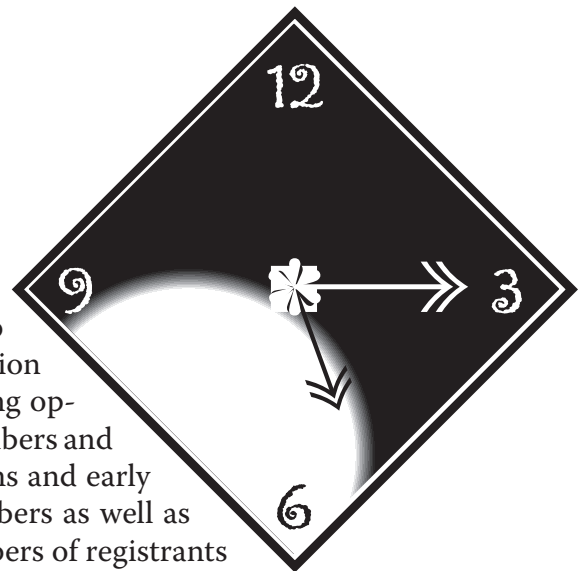

It's a Mad, Mad, Mad, Mad World in a Solar Car – the University of Michigan Solar Car

Have you ever wondered about the making of the U-M Solar Car? What makes it run? What is it like to ride in it? How hard is it to drive? Why does U-M spend so much time and energy racing these unusual-looking cars? This evening will answer all the questions you may have about the Solar Car. General arrangements have been, but we are unable to complete arrangements for this evening until the Fall Semester begins. The evening will be either a power point presentation or an in-person visit to the place where the Solar Car is assembled. (Details will be sent to you in the fall). The 2010 U-M Solar Car Team learned in June that it won the 2010 American Solar Challenge. This is the third consecutive North American title that went to a U-M team. Infinium, the current solar car, traveled 1,100 miles from Broken Arrow, Oklahoma, to Naperville, Illinois, and beat 16 other teams. The Solar Car Team is completely student run and typically involves about 200 student volunteers from U-M.

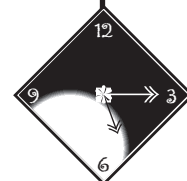

Information Security and You: Threats in Cyberspace and What You Should Know to Protect Your Information and Yourself

This session will provide information about current trends in using technology, the principles of fair information practice, threats to personal privacy and best practices to protect the security and privacy of personal information. Leading the session will be Virginia Rezmierski, adjunct associate professor in the Ford School of Public Policy and the School of Information, University of Michigan. She retired as director of the Instructional Technology Office of Policy Development and Education in 2000 and continues to teach – computer ethics – as an adjunct associate professor in both of the schools. She is an educational psychologist by training and has been dealing with the security and policy issues accompanying information technologies for approximately 30 years.

Changing Inmates' Lives Through Art

The mission of the Prison Creative Arts Project (PCAP) is to collaborate with incarcerated youth and adults, urban youth, and the formerly incarcerated to strengthen our community through creative expression. Founders William “Buzz” Alexander and Janie Paul will speak about this phenomenal program that has facilitated hundreds of workshops since 1990 and curated 15 major exhibitions of art by Michigan prisoners.

Three Weeks in Peru

Van Harrison and Bill Roberts will present a travelog exploring some of the history of Peru. Peru encompasses deserts on the Pacific Coast, lush highlands in the Andes, and the eastern descent to the headwaters of the Amazon. A visit provides glimpses into more than 3,000 years of civilizations, including the Mochica, Nazca, Sican, and Chimu on the coast, the Tiwanaku and then the Inca in the highlands, the Spanish conquistadors and Spain's trading center for South America, independence, recent internal terrorism, and current growth.
