THE POLITICS OF IRRATIONALITY- **CANCELED; WILL START IN MARCH INSTEAD**

Format: readings, group discussion

We live in a time of great tension. These tensions are fed by the mass media, cable news, and the internet – all of these shoulder the blame for the current hysteria that plagues us. Though these are relatively new parts of our culture, the current wave of irrationality is a recurrent phenomenon in the history of American politics. In our course, we plan to discuss this cultural condition, explore its roots and relate it to some of the institutional peculiarities of our politics. The basic text will be Richard Hofstadter's classic *Anti-Intellectualism in American Life*. Hofstadter, arguably the greatest historian of the United States after the death of Henry Adams in 1918, was an extremely graceful writer, who won his second Pulitzer Prize for this study. He explores anti-intellectualism in religion, business, politics, and education, all placed in a broader setting. It is important to remember that the irrationality he writes about has not been historically confined to any one party or ideological stance, but is a frequently occurring feature of American politics. This is a long but very readable book and we suggest that you get a head start on the reading before the first meeting of the class. It can be ordered at Borders or from Amazon.com. The Nibelungenlied, the German national medieval epic combines such contradictory elements as the pagan warrior ethic and Christian courtly conventions, myth and history. Two Fritz Lang silent movies, *Siegfried and Kriemhild's Revenge* which cast a Nazi biased view on the epic will be viewed. The text is *German Epic Poetry*, ed. by Francis G. Gentry and James K. Walter (New York: Continuum, 1995) of which pages 1-8 should be read for the first meeting. Max E. Noordhoorn, who taught German Language and Literature at Albion College, will be the instructor.

THREE MEXICAN WOMEN WRITERS

Format: readings, group discussion

Participants in this class will be introduced to three well-known Mexican writers, Elena Garro (1920-1998), Rosario Castellanos (1926-1947), and Elena Poniatowska (1932--). Elena Garro's novel, *Recollection of Things to Come* (Los Recuerdos Del Porvenir, 1963) has been considered one of the most important Mexican novels of the 20th century. With the Mexican Revolution (1910) and the Cristeros Rebellion (1926-1929) as background, the novel is a meditation on the meaning of time in a small Mexican town. Rosario Castellanos in her book *The Nine Guardians*, (Balún Canán, 1957) looks into the period of Lázaro Cárdenas' presidency, (1934-1940) and its impact on the state of Chiapas. Castellanos, a well known poet, author and essayist died prematurely in an accident in Tel Aviv where she was Mexico's Ambassador. Elena Poniatowska, a journalist, novelist, short-story writer, and essayist, is the author of several testimonial narratives. Widely known and translated into many languages, the socially conscious Poniatowska recreates in *Dear Diego, Quiela Embraces You* (Querido Diego, Te Quire Quiela, 1978) the love and relationship between Diego Rivera, the Mexican painter, and Angelina Beloff, a Russian painter exiled in France. As always, the class will be based on the close reading of the texts and analysis of their cultural, historical and literary characteristics. The first reading will be Elena Garro's novel; it would help if you could come

to the first class with some reading done, such as the first 50 pages. Books may be ordered through Barnes and Noble and Borders book stores. Eliana Moya-Raggio is Professor Emeritus at UofM.

PROSE VERSUS POETRY

Format: readings, group discussion

Participants will discuss the ultimately unanswerable question, "What distinguishes prose from poetry?" The class will be taught by Bernard Van't Hul, Professor Emeritus in the UofM English department. Prof. Van't Hul will introduce the question but not lecture on it. He will provide short "take-home" handouts along with samples of poetry from The New Yorker Magazine, and both poems and excerpts from essays by well-known English and American poets to "on" the "poetry question." Professor Van't Hul, retired more than 15 years ago. On the UM English faculty he was on the editorial staff of the Middle-English Dictionary (10 years); he was the Director of Introductory Composition (4 years); and over the decades he taught graduate and undergraduate courses in Old & Middle English language & literature, as in fiction and contemporary poetry.
